Buxton Crescent

Leicester Cathedral

Built on a Roman site, Leicester Cathedral has been a central focus of the city for over 1,000 years. Recent remarkable archaeological discoveries under the Cathedral Gardens include Anglo-Saxon, Roman and prehistoric activity dating back millennia. The newly opened Heritage & Learning Centre is a treasure trove of fascinating ancient objects. See the Cathedral's magnificent tomb of King Richard III, with two new stained-glass windows by Tom Derry in tribute to the last English King lost in battle.

King Richard III Visitor Centre

The King Richard III Visitor Centre charts the story of the King's life and death. Here we learn about one of the greatest archaeological detective stories ever told, as we fast forward over 500 years to a car park in Leicester where the long-lost remains of King Richard III are discovered and verified, ending many years of speculation!

Buxton Crescent Experience

The thermal spa town of Buxton is the gateway to the Peak District, renowned for its fine Georgian and Victorian architecture. Dating back to 1789, the Buxton Crescent Experience is a unique visitor attraction set within the beautiful Grade I listed Crescent Hotel. Discover the story of how the town inspired by water came to be here, developed and grew over the last 10,000 years.

Haddon Hall

This fine, fortified medieval manor house enjoys uninterrupted views of the beautiful Peak District countryside. Parts of the house date back to the 12th century, and the property is surrounded by stunning terraced gardens bursting with rose blooms. The romance of the atmosphere here means that Haddon Hall is a popular choice as a film and television location.



Ladybower Reservoir

Eyam, Castleton & Ladybower Reservoir

The beautiful historic village of Eyam in the Peak District National Park became famous after managing to contain an outbreak of the plague during the Black Death of 1665 and 1666. The village of Castleton lies in the lee of the mysterious Mam Tor and sits by the enormous Peak Cavern. It's known as the home of the unique semi-precious stone Blue John, a lovely gem with bands of blueish violet that can only be found in the Peak District. Ladybower Reservoir sits amongst the stunning scenery of the area, with wonderful views of the woodlands, water & moorland.

Eyam Museum

Eyam Museum tells the stories of the famous village of Eyam including its experience of plague in 1665-1666, and its wider social history and industrial heritage.

Chatsworth House

The magnificent Chatsworth House is a palatial home in the heart of the Peak District, which dates back to the 16th century. Today, the lavishly adorned interiors house a significant collection of art and treasures that span more than 4,000 years: from ancient Egyptian sculptures and pieces by Reynolds and Rembrandt, to contemporary portraits by Lucian Freud. Don't miss the incredible gardens—cultivated over centuries, they contain sculptures, a rock garden and a maze.

Crich Tramway Museum

Go back in time at Crich Tramway Village and The National Tramway. Take a ride on one of the world-renowned vintage trams through the recreated historical street and out into the open countryside for spectacular views. Find out more by visiting the fascinating exhibitions and watch from the Workshop Viewing Gallery as trams are restored.

Crowne Plaza Royal Victoria Sheffield

Sheffield's most historic hotel, built in 1862 is a Grade II listed building and former train station, conveniently situated within walking distance of the city centre. Bedrooms are en-suite and offer the amenities you would expect of a 4* hotel, including tea/coffee making facilities. The hotel's elegant restaurant serves breakfast and contemporary British cuisine for dinner. The traditional styled Grand Lounge Bar with an ornate design of chandeliers, pillars and high ceilings is the perfect spot to relax and enjoy a pre-dinner drink. The hotel has a lift.
